PRINCIPLE 13: Assess [Consider] Economic Impacts


As part of the planning process, assess [consider] the fiscal impact and economic viability of proposed development in the area.

Objectives for Principle 13


- Design for commercial success. Cluster retail development to create enough critical mass for the shops to succeed.
- In making land use recommendations, recognize the importance of economic viability for those who will build.
- Assess the impact of the plan on the town's fiscal health.
- Assess the impact that development in the area will have on the Chapel Hill–Carrboro school system.
